

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sitters



In a recent survey the British were declared the worst dressed people in Europe.

The French are turned out in elegance and style. Italians have a Mediterranean flair. But the British are relegated to last place when it comes to fashion sense. The frumpy tweed jacket and knotted hanky are no match for their continental cousins.

John the Baptist was not British, but he would have come in last on the catwalk. Dressed in camel's hair and a leather belt, he would have stuck out like a sore thumb here in Bergen County.

And yet this odd ball was a magnet for all who saw him. What attracted them? Certainly not his fashion sense! People flocked to him to... acknowledge their sins!

This is the heart of Advent. St. Charles Borromeo says that Advent makes present the fact that the Father sent his only Son to free us from the tyranny of Satan. The Church asks us to understand that Christ, who came once in the flesh, is prepared to come again, when we remove all obstacles to his presence.

The greatest obstacle is sin.

Of course you can't talk about sin today. People can talk about God, they can quote Jesus, they can discuss the Bible. But sin must never be mentioned. Ours is another anthropology, that of the 'Bon Savage.' We are all fundamentally good, we have an innate beatitude, we are all children of God. Everyone goes to heaven. We have no sin. We have a musical soul.

Post modernity proclaims there is no objective truth. There are opinions, and everyone is entitled to their opinion, to do what they think best. There is a gradualism of conscience. The truth, the good, what is right, is dictated at an individual level.

John the Baptist was having none of this. He proclaimed repentance and a Baptism for forgiveness of sin. The amazing thing is that people took him seriously. They accepted that they were, in fact, sinners.

Perhaps this is not so surprising. A recent psychological report said that many of the complexes people suffer from can be traced to one thing: a radical lack of humility. Humility is the truth. The truth is that we are flawed, we are sinners, we are in need of repentance, we are in need of the grace of God. When this truth is not present, we live in an alienation, a false reality.

John the Baptist's voice will resound at the Deanery Advent Penance Celebration, in Assumption Parish, Emerson, on Monday December 18th at 7:30pm. It will be a sobering dose of reality. We will be confronted with our brokenness, but also the great truth that we can be freed from the tyranny of Satan.

May we hear the Baptist's voice, and receive his message, no matter what clothes he might be wearing!


Eternity's Clock and Crown

What is this Advent wreath whose four candles help us mark the passing of the weeks before Christmas? It is eternity's clock—a circle that says "In our ending is our beginning." It is the



wheel of time—a circle of evergreen branches—cut and left to wither—revealing that death and life are both of a piece. It is also a crown, the victor's laurel garland, the sign that the race is done, the prize won. It is the crown of us as a people, a chosen race, a royal priesthood. It is the crown of each of us as individuals—baptized individuals (all of a piece) whose heads were smeared with that royal oil, chrism. We are marked for eternity. With four candles lit, the Advent wreath is the fiery crown that we give to Christ the King, the Savior who returns in the growing gloom to gather us into our eternal home, the new and heavenly Jerusalem.

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Advent means "coming" and is a time when many prepare for Christ's coming/ return. Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. Many Christians use an Advent wreath or Advent calendar to mark the days leading up to Christ's Mass a.k.a. Christmas, which was a holy day from

which we get the word "holiday". In the Middle Ages, people believed Christ's return was imminent, so the weeks before Christmas were set aside to prepare for the Second Coming.



Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe December 12

In Advent of 1531, an Aztec peasant named Juan Diego (whose birth name in the Náhuatl language was Cuautlatohua) saw an astounding sight—a radiant woman clothed in the stars, with the moon at her feet.

She bore the appearance of a Central American Indian, and she was dressed in native garb. She even wore the traditional sash of a pregnant woman. This was a paradoxical image, for at the time when the Lady of Guadalupe manifested herself, the Indian people were deeply oppressed by their Spanish conquerors. Their everyday experience was one of profound powerlessness. Indian women, especially, were treated cruelly.

The woman spoke to Juan Diego tenderly, calling him her beloved son. The peasant went to his bishop, but the bishop did not think it possible that the Queen of Heaven would appear to a poor man on a barren hillside. As a sign of her presence for the skeptical bishop, the Lady left her glorious image on Juan Diego's cloak of agave cactus cloth. At her request, a church was built at the site where she had appeared—near modernday Mexico City. Pilgrims come from many nations to honor her there, especially on her feast day, December 12.

The oppressed native people recognized Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe as a promise of justice and a cause for hope. Peace treaties have been signed in the basilica that bears her name. She is the patron saint of Mexico, and she is honored throughout the Americas.

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
