People can, and even do, risk their lives for a noble cause. Firefighters do so when they run into a burning building. Police too, every time they strap on their bullet proof vest and step outside the door to begin a shift. A parent at the beach will give their life to save a drowning son or daughter. A teacher will shield students from an intruder.

The Firefighter, the Cop, the parent, the teacher, is willing to give their life to save another.

We are the ones in the burning building. We are the ones in harms' way. We are those who are drowning.
