There are many ways to say “Thank you”.

Thanksgiving Day has its origins in September 1620, when the Mayflower sailed from Britain with 102 souls on board, seeking to form a colony where they could freely practice religion. They were Separatists, separating themselves from the Church of England. Having arrived on these shores, one year later 46 of them had survived; with an abundant harvest, they invited 91 Native Americans to join them in a celebration of Thanksgiving.

President Lincoln drafted the first Thanksgiving Day proclamation while the Nation was in the midst of a bitter and bloody Civil War. Lincoln envisioned the day as a day of prayer in thanks to God for His blessings on the country and prayer for an end to that bloody struggle.

A recent survey of airline attendants said that on an average flight an attendant will say ‘thank you’ several hundred times to the passengers on board. The survey also said that many passengers do not reciprocate. A simple ‘thank you’ from a passenger goes a long way, the airline crews said.

On Thursday November 23rd we are invited to give thanks, and we can do so, as the Psalm says “At all times”; our giving thanks can be found in the most unexpected of places.

We can be thankful for the mess to clean up after the dinner because it means I have been surrounded by friends.

We can be thankful that there is yard work to do and leaves and fallen branches to clean up, because it means I have two arms.

We can be thankful for the heating bill, because it means I am warm.
